Will tolerate wet ground and have broad base with branches to the 12. Western Larch. Larix occidentalis. Unusual deciduous conifer, prefers dry soil, green in spring and golden in fall. On a dark cloudy 13. Pacific Madrone. Arbutus menziesii. Native to west coast. Flowers produce red berries in fall. Rich orange-red bark that when mature naturally peels away in thin sheets. Used as a landscape tree, shade tolerant and good for bird nesting and soil erosion control in 20. Oregon Grape. Mahonia aquilolium. A plant with 2 to 3 pinnately compound leaves with leathery, holly-like leaflets on low, short stems ending in dense, branched clusters of small flowers. 21. Salal. Gaultheria shallon. Low evergreen shrub. Glossy oval 

**CARE AND PLANTING INSTRUCTIONS:** Plant as soon as possible. Keep bare root seedlings in a cool, shady place. **Do Not Let Roots Dry.** Dig hole 1' deep, spreading roots as you fill hole to just above collar with soil. **Do not let roots turn up like "J."** Firm soil around roots to remove air pockets. Keep weed/grass free 2-3 yrs. No need to fertilize the first year.
