CEDAR

1. **Western Red Cedar.** *Thuja plicata*. NW native. Single trees are magnificent. Likes wet ground, shade or sun...P-1.....**\$1.00**
2. **Incense Cedar.** *Calocedrus decurrens*. Symmetrical with dense narrow pyramidal crown. Makes a great property screen.Banded Pot.....9-12"**\$4.00**

FIR

3. **Douglas Fir.** *Pseudotsuga menziesii*. King of NW forest, likes full sun, not wet areas, fast growing.....1-1.....**\$1.00**
4. **Fraser Fir.** *Abies fraseri*..Popular high-end Christmas tree. Silver needles and fragrant.....3-0.....**\$2.00**
5. **Grand Fir.** *Abies grandis*. One of the tallest true firs. Nice ornamental or Christmas tree stock.....2-1....8-16".....**\$2.00**
6. **Noble Fir.** *Abies procera*. Native to NW. Pyramidal with even whorls. Great landscape and Christmas tree...042...6-12".....**\$2.00**

HEMLOCK

7. **Western Hemlock.** *Tsuga heterophylla*. Washington State tree. Likes damp, shady or sunny area. Handsome tree with fern-like foliage and drooping branches. Can be cut back and pruned into hedges.....2-0.....8".....**\$1.00**

PINE

8. **Ponderosa Pine.** *Pinus ponderosa*. Large broad conical crown with spreading branches. Stately, rugged, fire-resistant bark with age.....2-0.....10+".....**\$2.00**
9. **Scotch Pine.** *Pinus Sylvestris*. Moderately fast-growing pine. Tolerates moist soils, but prefers well-drained sites. Does best in sunny areas.....2-1.....12-24".....**\$2.00**

SPRUCE

10. **Sitka Spruce.** *Picea sitchensis*. Fast-growing native timber species is moisture tolerant and can grow to 200 ft.....15+"..... **\$1.00**

OTHER SPECIES

11. **Giant Sequoia.** *Sequoiadendron giganteum*. This is the largest tree in the world! They grow fast in this area but do not reproduce. Will tolerate wet ground and have broad base with branches to the ground.....1-0.....8+".....**\$2.00**
12. **Western Larch.** *Larix occidentalis*. Unusual deciduous conifer, prefers dry soil, green in spring and golden in fall. On a dark cloudy day it looks like sunshine.....3-0.....15-18".....**\$3.00**
13. **Pacific Madrone.** *Arbutus menziesii*. Native to west coast. Flowers produce red berries in fall. Rich orange-red bark that when mature naturally peels away in thin sheets. Leaves are thick with a waxy texture.....6+".....**\$4.00**
14. **Ginkgo.** *Ginkgo biloba*. Maidenhair Tree native to North America millions of years ago. Deciduous with fall golden color, slow growing....Transplanted 1 year-**Potted**...3-2.....15-30".....**\$10.00**
15. **Oregon Ash.** *Fraxinus latifolia*. A fast growing wetland tree used for firewood and pulp chips.....24-36".....**\$1.00**
16. **Red Alder.** *Alnus rubra*. Fast growing timber tree. Nitrogen fixer for the soil. Will tolerate wet soils.....24".....**\$2.00**
17. **Oregon White Oak.** *Quercus garryana*. Native of Northwest. The flowers are catkins, the fruit a small acorn.8-12".....**\$2.00**
18. **Red Osier Dogwood.** *Cornus sericea*. Spread or loosely branching shrub 5-15' tall, white flowers with red berries. Stream bank cover and wildlife habitat.....24-36".....**\$3.00**
19. **Vine Maple.** *Acer circinatum*. Used as a landscape tree, shade tolerant and good for bird nesting and soil erosion control in addition to fall colors.....24-36".....**\$3.00**
20. **Oregon Grape.** *Mahonia aquilolium*. A plant with 2 to 3 pinnately compound leaves with leathery, holly-like leaflets on low, short stems ending in dense, branched clusters of small flowers.8-12".....**\$1.00**
21. **Salal.** *Gaultheria shallon*. Low evergreen shrub. Glossy oval leaves used for greenery by floristplugs.....**\$1.00**

CARE AND PLANTING INSTRUCTIONS: Plant as soon as possible. Keep bare root seedlings in a cool, shady place. **Do Not Let Roots Dry.** Dig hole 1' deep, spreading roots as you fill hole to just above collar with soil. **Do not let roots turn up like "J."** Firm soil around roots to remove air pockets. Keep weed/grass free 2-3 yrs. No need to fertilize the first year.
